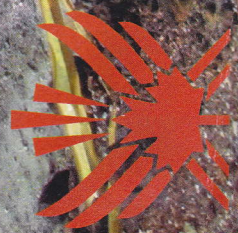


Foreign investment and human rights:

One of the most important challenges of the 21st century is to ensure that the increasing amount of foreign investment and corporate activity does not contradict our commitments to human rights. This affects millions of people around the world. Many of those whose lives may be fundamentally transformed by corporate activity are ill-equipped to negotiate with companies or to participate in government decision-making.

To address these challenges, Rights & Democracy has developed a methodology that allows civil society organizations to determine the impact of investment on the human rights of individuals and communities and to more effectively voice their concerns regarding these issues. Since 2004, this methodology has been tested in several countries.

This public panel will hear from various stakeholders (private sector, civil society, experts) interested in the impact of foreign investment on human rights. Their experiences will help us to identify the main challenges that they have encountered in their work and best practices for overcoming them.

Panel 1: Issues and challenges of documenting human rights impacts

This panel discusses the challenges of documenting the impacts of foreign investments on human rights. The discussions will revolve around the identification of solutions to these challenges.
